

Lap Bags, Repair Kits & Deck Bags – Sea Kayak Guide Kit ideas

The below listed items are recommendations as to what a commercial guide might consider carrying in their “Lap Bag” and Repair Kit. This list is by no means exhaustive, nor are all the items essential. It is realistic to think that a guide makes their own decisions about what to carry and how to carry it.

NOTE to consider: When guiding in “typical commercial conditions”, i.e. where seas are typically not rough, it is appropriate to think a lap bag be a good choice – as removing spray skirt is relatively safe to do in these conditions**HOWEVER...**

When considering guiding in rough conditions (class 3-4 waters), i.e. in tide races or traveling in rough seas and around headlands, opening the spray skirt can compromise the guide. **THEREFORE**, I would urge for the consideration of a front deck bag in these instances that contains a smaller amount of essential items that might be necessary in such rough water conditions (see recommended list at the bottom of this page).

Life is a compromise!!! Carrying enough supplies to get by, but not so much to way you down, is important! Choose wisely, and think it through... you are also allowed to change your mind!
